Councillors voice concerns over clogged drainage ditch

After years of maintaining a ditch behind his home, Rocco Falzone finally has some much overdue support for keeping his neighborhood from flooding.

Falzone, 78, has lived at 55 Tuscano Drive for 28 years, and for 28 years, he has donned his rubber boots and tools to make sure the ditch running behind his house is clear of debris. If he doesn't do it, his property floods and

so do his neighbors on Asti Avenue and the surrounding area. But it's too much now. He has attended several meetings of the City Council, he's created a packet documenting the problem, he's met with local and state officials, but a solution is yet to come.

"His concerns are real and valid," said Councillor Dan Rizzo. "He's been incredibly impacted during storm events. It's not a good situation to put

NECCO plant to close doors on American Legion Hgwy

One man's attempt at crowd-funding for a beloved candy company may have fallen short of the May 4 deadline date, but the call for help continues. Just under 100 employ-

ees will say goodbye to their jobs this week at NECCO (New England Confectionary Company) on Friday.

Up in the air are also the recipes of NECCO wafers, candy hearts, Sky Bars, Squirrel Nuts, Mary Janes, candy

dots, and more. In addition, what will happen to the specialized machines, some that date back to the 1940s also remains unknown.

Revere High graduation set for June 7

Just another hidden consequence to the popularity of the Revere Public Schools and its growing enrollment is getting all of the students and families into and out of Harry Della Russo Stadium for graduation exercises.

Supt. Dianne Kelly announced that graduation will take place at the Stadium on Thursday, June 7, and there will be more than 500 students graduating this year - another blockbuster class.

Five weeks away from the big day, Kelly said they are meeting with Fire Chief Chris Bright and police officials to try to iron out some details when it comes to moving so many people all at once.

"There are concerns from last year about the Stadium being overcrowded and the egresses when people were leaving," she said. "We're going to meet with the Police

Mike McGee were unsuccessful.

The building was purchased by Atlantic Management and VMD Companies who teamed up to buy the 50-acre site for \$54.6 million last year. The lease for the 830,000-square-foot building expires in August.

"Hostess went through this and came out on top," said former NECCO employee Alisa Hills. "We would hate for NECCO to go away."

Former CEO Ed Gulachenski (2011-2015) launched a Go Fund me page to save NECCO a couple of weeks ago.

Since then he's raised over \$4,320 for 101 different people. Donations range from \$5 to \$500.

Hills said when Gulachenski announced the crowdfunding idea his phone rang more than expected.

Gulachenski has said he needs \$30 million to buy the company. He plans to put in \$5-\$10 million of his own fund and raise the additional money through crowd-sourcing.

NECCO's CEO Mark McGee notified Revere Mayor Brian Arrigo that without a buyer by May 6, the 171-year

old confectionary company would have to layoff employees. NECCO, the New England Confectionary Co., moved into a building at 135 American Legion Highway back in 2003 after being in Cambridge for years.

The makers of NECCO wafers, candy conversation hearts, Clark Bars, and a dozen other candy products, reported steady revenues in 2005 of \$100 million. In 2010 NECCO was listed for sale with a New York broker, but then the listing was pulled in 2011.

DCR REMINDS THE PUBLIC OF THE DANGERS OF SWIMMING IN COLD WATER TEMPERATURES

With forecasts predicting summer-like temperatures

of 80 degree weather later this week, the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) is reminding the public of the dangers associated with swimming in water bodies this time of year. Currently, water temperatures in Massachusetts lakes and ponds are in the 40's and 50's, while ocean temperatures remain in the 40's. Swimming in such cold water, even in short periods of time, can quickly cause hypothermia in the human body.

"After such a long winter season, the Department of Conservation and Recreation is ecstatic to have people from all over the Commonwealth having the opportunity to get outside and enjoy our state parks and other natural resources," said DCR Commissioner Leo Roy. "With the start of warmer air temperatures, it is important that we all use caution near water bodies, particularly this time of year, when cold water temperatures can be detrimental to one's safety."

Hypothermia can set in at approximately 15-30 minutes in 32.5-40 degree water temperatures, and 30-60 minutes in 40-50 degree water temperatures. Additionally, cold water robs the body of heat 32 times faster than cold air, can cause the body to experience muscle spasms and cramps, and can cause the body to go into shock and begin hyperventilating. If you or someone you are with were to fall into a water body, it is extremely important to not panic, and to conserve energy to avoid exhaustion and unconsciousness.

Symptoms of hypothermia include: shivering; dizziness; nausea; increased breathing;

difficulty in speaking; confusion; diminished coordination; fatigue; and an increase in heart rate. Furthermore, it is important to note that the DCR starts guarding major coastal and inland beaches weekends only on Memorial Day Weekend. Beaches will not be guarded seven days a week until June 16. Those who choose to swim at a location where a lifeguard is not on duty, do so at their own risk.

"SAY NO TO DRUGS"

Chelsea Soldiers' Home secures federal funding for Center

Gov. Charlie Baker announced last Friday that the state has secured approximately \$70 million in federal funding for the new 154-bed Community Living Center at the Chelsea Soldiers' Home – federal funding that pretty much gives the green light to proceed on the project.

State leaders have made a priority of designing and funding the \$199 million project, but getting the federal funding was always a crucial piece of the puzzle that had to come through.

On Friday, the Veteran's

Administration State Home Construction Grant Program announced it would provide a 65 percent reimbursement of approved construction projects, including the Soldiers' Home.

"Our veterans have sacrificed greatly to protect our freedoms and we are proud to see this project move forward as we continue to provide them with great care and dignity," said Baker. "We are grateful to the VA for their support of Massachusetts' veterans and this funding allows us to construct a state-of-the-art facility that will be a model for future veteran homes

across the country."

The Community Living Center at the Chelsea Soldiers' Home will provide 154 "home-like" rooms for veterans in accordance with VA standards of design, which promotes greater accessibility, mobility, and enhanced quality of life. Services will include physical and occupational therapy, recreational activities and greater access to the outdoors. The current facility, the Quigley Memorial Long Term Care Center, will continue to be fully operational during the construction process with an

• May - Celebrating Revere Schools

The Revere Public Schools kicked off an entire month of activities Tuesday night, May 1, to celebrate the schools in the community.

Tuesday's celebration was the 'May the Arts Be With You' event, where artwork from all over the district was on display. On Wednesday, May 9, the Student Showcase will take place at Revere High from 5-8 p.m. That event is in conjunction with the Massachusetts Consortium for Innovative Education Assessment. On Wednesday, May 16, the PTO Showcase will take place at Revere High from 5-6:30 p.m.

Finally, the Five District

Partnership – which includes Revere – will take place on Thursday, May 24, at Winthrop High School from 4:30 to 7 p.m.

• House Budget Encouraging

The House Budget passed last week by the state House of Representatives has some encouraging news regarding school financing – and word from Beacon Hill is that the funding changes will outlast any vetoes from Gov. Charlie Baker.

The House put in a \$12.5 million "Pothole Account" to help districts hurt by the change in 'Economically Disadvantaged' definitions a few years ago. Last year, there was no such funding, but this year it looks like that money will make it through.

"With the pothole fund, we'll be okay; without it, we'll have a challenging year," she said.

The money would be allocated to the state Department of Elementary and Secondary

Education (DESE), and they would be charged with disbursing it to the affected district.

Kelly said she has heard from Speaker Bob DeLeo's office that Revere will be okay.

"The Speaker's office has been very proactive in communicating with us and letting us know Revere schools will have what they need next year," she said.

• MCAS Week is a Quiet Week

Many might have wondered why the Revere Public Schools are unusually quiet this week. Well, a lot of it has to do with MCAS testing, which has been going on all week.

Each grade level across the district tests on the same day, and the schools try to avoid testing on Mondays or Fridays. A special breakfast is served to students taking the test as well.

a minimum screening for an off-street parking area.

He said initial plans call for a 1.21 parking ratio, which is 142 spaces. He noted they are also building 38 spaces on Ocean Avenue parcel and this will make the parking ratio 1.4 parking spaces

"It's all being designed consistent with the RC2 zoning district and we're also designing for the "creative arts" district not yet on zoning maps for the city," Zarri said. The creative arts district runs from the Gate Residential Property all the way to Shirley Avenue to encourage retail, restaurant, art galleries, and seasonal open space.

"Our development includes a 4,000 square-foot restaurant, a series of arcade/retail spaces covering 1,600 square feet," Zarri said, calling the area a highly underutilized one and an area that will have upgraded sidewalks and a rebuilt boardwalk.

Ward 1 Councillor Joanne McKenna said she was pleased with the recent deed restriction that states the two buildings can only be sold together. She also noted that the front building would block the view of the people who live at

Surfside Lofts.

"I don't know how we can help them with their concerns because they bought there because of the views of the beach," McKenna said, adding she feels strongly about developing Revere Beach. "It's long overdue. We have parcels that haven't been built on, buildings falling down. Anything that brings revenue to the city and brings people to Revere Beach, I'm in favor of."

Bob O'Brien, director of development for Revere, is also a resident of Surfside Lofts at 10 Ocean Ave. He made it clear to the Zoning Board he was there for the city. He called that the two parcels under discussion are some of the most attractive waterfront parcels in the northeast.

"It's very timely they're

now being developed as residential," O'Brien said, adding that the restaurant and retail space is also timely and requests that came from the councillors, the mayor and the city. "This is a very worthy project."

This will be Gate Residential's third property in Revere totaling more than \$270 million investment.

President Trump plans to make drugs affordable again

During his State of the Union address, President Trump pledged to drive down drug prices.

That's a worthy goal. Fortunately, the Trump administration is already pursuing it in ways that protect patients and encourage research and development. Many strategies that candidate Trump proposed on the campaign trail would have done more harm than good.

Candidate Trump wanted to repeal Medicare Part D's "non-interference clause," which prevents the federal government from negotiating drug prices with manufacturers. Private insurers currently handle negotiations for Part D, a prescription drug program that benefits about 42 million Americans.

Such interference wouldn't result in lower prices. Private insurers already extract discounts from drug companies. Giving federal bureaucrats the power to negotiate prices "would have a negligible effect on Medicare drug spending," according to the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office.

Federal negotiators could only obtain lower prices by establishing a national formulary of preferred drugs. That would make many medications completely inaccessible

for seniors.

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs uses such a formulary. As a result, veterans don't have access to nearly 20 percent of the most commonly prescribed drugs under Medicare Part D.

Candidate Trump also advocated for drug price controls.

Imposing such caps would hinder efforts to develop breakthrough medications, as pharmaceutical companies would struggle to justify research expenditures. Nations that rely on price controls to artificially keep prices low are free riding on U.S. patients, who fund the bulk of medical research and development. The average new medicine costs about \$2.6 billion to bring to market.

The Trump administration jettisoned these counterproductive policy proposals. It's now pursuing measures that curb costs while improving the quality of American health care.

Consider the president's reauthorization of PDUFA, a 1992 law allowing the FDA to charge pharmaceutical companies for reviewing drug applications. This extra revenue enables the FDA to review applications faster. As a result, more medications make it to market sooner -- opening up options for consumers and

lowering prices through competition.

Another promising step is a proposed rule from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). The rule would curb price gouging by pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs). These middlemen negotiate with drug manufacturers to obtain discounts for insurance companies.

PBMs use their buying power to extract rebates from drug makers. From 2010 to 2015, the value of those rebates increased by more than 20 percent annually. But patients picking up their prescriptions often don't benefit from these rebates.

The rule would require PBMs to pass along some of these rebates to Medicare patients. Beneficiaries could pocket more than \$10 billion in total savings.

The biggest reforms are taking place at the FDA. Commissioner Scott Gottlieb has endorsed "adaptive" clinical

trials, which allow researchers to adjust experimental drug tests based on real-world evidence. This speeds up the R&D process and results in savings for drug companies, more drug applications for the FDA, and more options for patients. More drugs on the market force manufacturers to compete on price.

On the campaign trail, candidate Trump promised he would deliver lower drug prices. One year into his presidency, he's on his way to achieving that goal -- thanks to his abandonment of statist price controls and embrace of free-market reforms.

Mr. Falzone or the neighborhood in"

Rizzo wants officials to go to the ditch and see what is happening.

Not only do storms cause problems, but yard waste dumped in the ditch upstream, discarded furniture, tree branches and general trash add to the problem.

"Let's identify steps that need to be taken," Rizzo said.

Last week the city council sent a motion presented by Rizzo, Ward 6 Councillor Charles Patch, and Council President Jessica Giannino to the mayor to request a meeting with the state delegation, representatives from the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT), DPW Superintendent Donald Goodwin, Water/Sewer Foreman Joe Maglione, and Rocco Falzone of 55 Tuscano Ave. to discuss a long-term plan to address flooding issues affecting dozens of homes in the Asti and Tuscano avenue area.

"He's been fighting the fight for a long time," Patch said. "The city has been doing their job down there, but the state has no system in place. That whole culvert system goes through several cities and needs a complete work-over. The DPW is concerned

about Mr. Falzone due to his age. The city has done work there the last few years and there has been no flooding. I don't think the state comes down to the Revere part of it."

"Twenty-eight years of this, and it's finally falling on someone's ears, and I really appreciate that," Falzone said, adding he's been in touch with the Army Corp of Engineers, the DEP and the EPA. "Malden Street to the trash grates hasn't been touched in 50 years. This is not a one-shot deal this has to be maintained consistently forever."

Falzone noted that after a walk-through with State Rep. RoseLee Vincent, the DOT showed up to clean. Just last week inmates on a work program were picking up trash for a short amount of time, he said.

Josephine and Lisa Heddrington of 102 Asti Ave. said it's been an ongoing issue, and they have lost possessions in their basement due to flooding. Lisa Heddrington said it's not just water, it's also human waste. She disagreed with Patch about the situation getting better. They have added additional drainage to their property.

"These homes are contaminated," Lisa Heddrington said. "And this has happened repeatedly."

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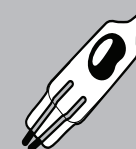
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REVERE YOUTH BASEBALL/SOFTBALL OPENS 2018 SEASON

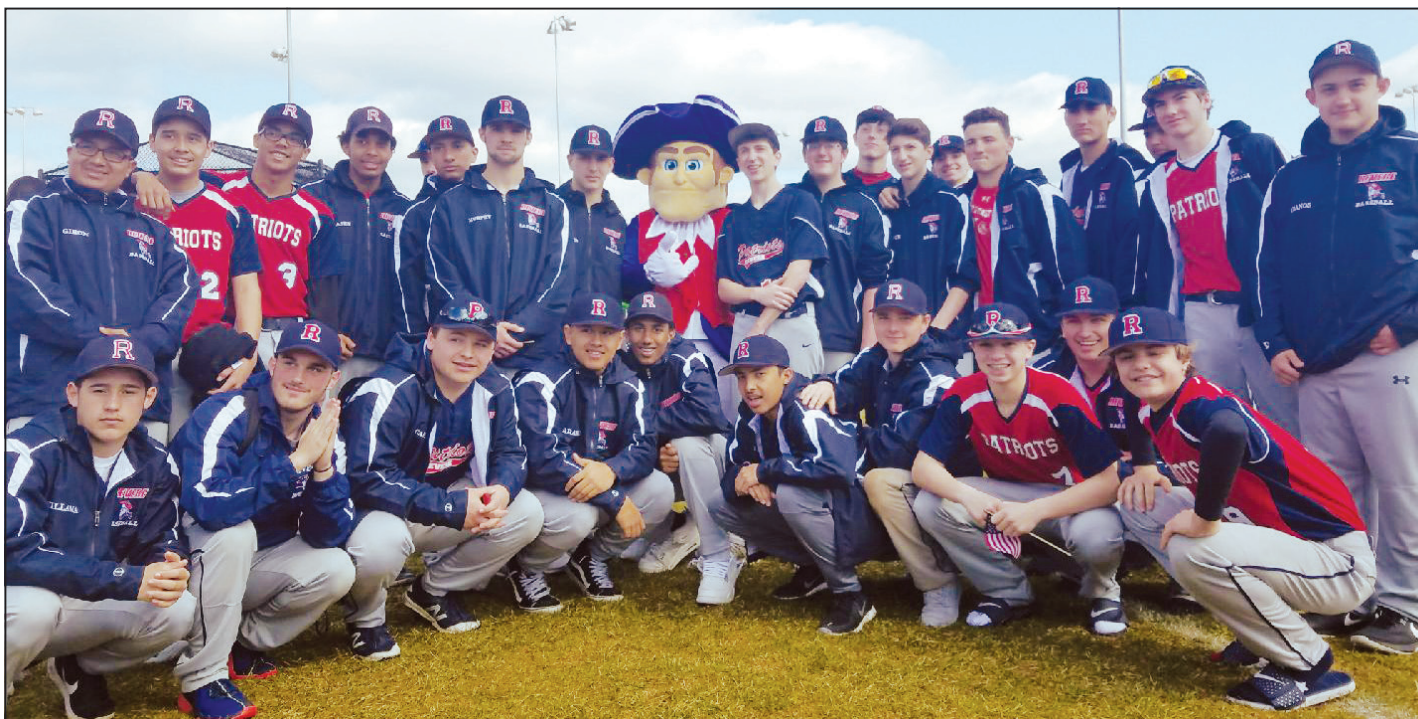

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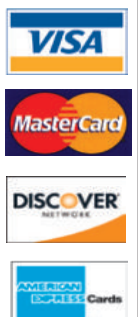

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NEWS FROM AROUND THE REGION

COUNCIL APPROVES TRANSFER TO STABILIZATION FUND

CHELSEA - The Chelsea City Council approved a request from City Manager Tom Ambrosino to clean up and make a big-time deposit into the City's savings accounts.

The Council approved a \$15 million transfer into the Stabilization Fund on Monday night, and also approved a \$5 million transfer into a new School Stabilization Fund. At the same time, three old savings accounts were closed out with about \$300,000 going into the Stabilization Fund.

The requests came at the behest of Councillor Bob Bishop, who made the requests last month and presided over a committee meeting two weeks ago discussing the matters.

Bishop had indicated that he would like the money in the Stabilization Fund because he believes the City needs to save more money in case of a downturn in the economy. On background, having the money in the Stabilization Fund gives the Council more control over any spending due to the fact that it requires a two-thirds vote of the Council.

Ambrosino said he supported both transfers and believed that the School Fund was a wise idea given that there are several projects coming up on the City's schools.

All of them, he said, are in the Capital Improvement Plan.

In the same financial vein, the Council approved the final \$3 million payment on the Clark Avenue Middle School project. The City has been paying cash wherever it can on the project - which is still under construction until this summer - to save money on interest payments accrued from having to borrow.

Part of the project is also funded by state reimbursements.

MYSTIC/TOBIN BRIDGE REPAIRS START MAY 7

CHELSEA - The state Department of Transportation (MassDOT) announced several changes to the Mystic/Tobin Bridge repair project, including the one-month closure of the Everett Avenue on-ramp May 7.

MassDOT announced that since several projects in the area are coming underway - including the Alford Street Bridge, the North Washington Street Bridge, and Commonwealth Avenue Bridge in Boston - they have adjusted the Tobin work to not close a lane permanently on the lower deck northbound.

This schedule adjustment means that MassDOT will

no longer be implementing a permanent lane closure on the lower deck (Route 1 northbound) from April 22 through November of this year, but will instead be adjusting the width of the travel lanes in this area and utilizing off-peak lane closures. Three full lanes of travel will be in place on the bridge this year during peak commute hours.

The full list of impacts this construction season is now as follows:

- Temporary off-peak lane closures on the lower deck (Route 1 northbound) from now through November 2018.

- Temporary off-peak lane closures on the upper deck (Route 1 southbound) from now through November 2018.

- Everett Avenue on-ramp closed at all times for one-month period beginning on May 7.

- Beacon Street off-ramp closed at all times for a two-month period beginning in summer 2018.

- Fourth Street off-ramp closed for a one-month period in 2019.

No more than one ramp will be closed at any given time throughout the duration of the project.

"We are investing historic levels of funding into our highway transportation system, and we are seeking to do so in ways that minimize impacts on the travel public and our local communities," said Highway Administrator Jonathan Gulliver. "Our construction teams have worked hard to optimize the schedule of operations to better accommodate travel throughout this area. We continue to encourage members of the public to learn about upcoming traffic impacts and use the appropriate tools to make the best decisions on traveling in order to reach their destinations in an efficient manner."

This \$41.6 million maintenance project involves repairing a section of the deck of the Tobin Bridge, which carries traffic between the Charlestown neighborhood of Boston and Chelsea. Work is scheduled to be completed at the end of 2020 with lane closures and traffic impacts occurring during each of the 2018, 2019, and 2020 construction seasons.

Work will include steel repairs to the upper and lower decks, concrete deck work on the lower deck, followed by waterproofing, resurfacing, and installing pavement markings. Operations will also consist of utility installation, installing curbing, paving, constructing a new parking lot under the bridge between Williams Street and Third Street.

MORE ACTION SOUGHT FOLLOWING COUNCILOR'S REMARKS

EVERETT -A group of protestors continued to mount

a resistance against Councilor Steve Simonelli on Monday, showing up to the City Council meeting to call for more action from the Council and also to discuss mounting a recall campaign under a City Charter process.

Not as many protestors showed up as two weeks ago following the Facebook comment fracas, but a healthy group gathered at City Hall prior to the meeting with signs and participated in a stand-out. Later, several from the group appeared in the Council chambers to speak at the meeting.

The group in protesting the comments, which were disparaging to Haitian residents, expressed their dissatisfaction with the handling of the elected official's remarks at a meeting two weeks ago.

Prior to last week's meeting, Councilor Steve Simonelli issued an apology which was shared on his social media account and presented during the Council meeting. Reactions have been torn, with some residents accepting the apology while others demand Simonelli take further action by stepping down from his role as City Councilor.

Family and loved ones of Simonelli sat in the front row of the Council Chambers throughout the meeting to show their support for him, while protestors grouped together behind them in solidarity. During the public speaking portion of the meeting, a few residents shared their concerns regarding the way the Everett City Council addressed the issue last week.

"I'm here tonight because I don't think the issue at hand from the last meeting was properly addressed," said Rev. Renee Solano, who read a very disparaging comment from Facebook that preceded Simonelli's response.

Everett High junior Destiny DePaulo said that the City Council should take action and be on the right side of history.

"I was shocked to hear the statement," she said. "I was even more shocked to learn it wasn't the first time, and there have been no consequences for him. This is not the Everett I know...Everett needs to stand on the right side of history and stand against these statements...The young people will take action. We'll not tolerate even a pinch of racism in our city."

However, according to City Solicitor Colleen Mejia, doing something about such comments on social media or in any other forum isn't so easy because elected officials have broad first Amendment privileges. While employees in the public and private sector are typically bound by social media usage policies, an elected official is not bound by that due to their 1st Amendment

freedoms as legislators.

Mejia said in the case of Simonelli, no rule or regulation had been broken.

"There was no rule, law, regulation or code violated," she said. "No law or no rule or no ethics code you determine has the right to infringe on people's free speech."

President Peter Napolitano said many in the public believe that the Council isn't doing anything. However, he said there isn't much the body can do that isn't unconstitutional. Simonelli does have the right to his free speech, and the Council cannot infringe on it.

He said he has been working on a set of rules, a code of conduct and a social media policy since January, but it isn't yet in place because it covers so much territory.

"We don't want it to appear to the public that this isn't important on the Council's part," he said. "We began a set of rules from A to Z in January. I identified early this year it was a priority. Now this situation comes up and we don't have a rule...The idea we're doing nothing isn't correct. We pro-actively sent these rules to committee to be worked on. For this situation, whether the question is should he have said it or shouldn't he have said it, the bottom line is it is within his rights to say it...On this matter the City Council is done. The City Council has no guidance on this. If the residents feel this needs to be taken further, there is a process. The City Council though can't take any type of action now. Trust me, we do not take this lightly."

The process within the charter is a recall petition, and many in the group of protestors have indicated they are beginning the process of gathering signatures to have such a recall - though they didn't confirm they would go through with it.

To get the process started, a group of residents needs to get 250 signatures of registered voters.

- The Boston Freightliner company on Lower Broadway was before the Council to get new licenses for the sale of trucks and for auto body repair. The company will soon be moving from Lower Broadway to near Seven Acre Park, where Wynn Boston Harbor has built them a brand-new facility in a relocation effort.

Both licenses were approved. The Lower Broadway facility is to be demolished in July.

- MEAN STREETS: Councilor Wayne Matewsky called up City Engineer Greg St. Louis for a discussion of the absolute deterioration of Bow, Cabot, Revere, Second and Winthrop streets.

"Bow Street - poor Bow Street - it's going to see a renaissance with the casino, but

it's in really bad shape now," he said.

Councilor John Hanlon said Second Street could be the worst he's seen.

"This is the worst street I've seen," he said. "The traffic is at a standstill and terrible because the trucks have to go so slow. The holes are too big for them to drive over."

St. Louis said the City has hired a consultant recently to investigate every street in the city and rank them according to condition. He said the study is done, but the final report is still in the works.

FIREFIIGHTERS, CITY SETTLE ON CONTRACT AFTER SEVERAL YEARS

CHELSEA - The City and the Firefighters' Union Local 143 have come to terms on a new contract that goes back two years to Fiscal Year 2016.

"It's finally concluded," said President Craig Hardy. "Both sides agree it's a fair deal. We all agree it's good that it's finally over...The membership ratified it overwhelmingly. It was a solid ratification with very little opposition. The membership seems to be satisfied and it's a fair deal."

Mayor Carlo DeMaria thanked the Union's negotiating team for working hard to resolve the contracts.

"Our firefighters put their lives on the line every day to protect our residents and their property," said the mayor. "I want to thank them for their service. I also want to acknowledge their negotiating team for their professionalism, mindfulness of other department's needs, and the financial status of the city."

The firefighters got 2 percent pay increases onto their base salaries over the two fiscal years within the contract, which was the major sticking

point in getting the agreement sealed.

On Monday night, the City Council approved the funding for the contract, with \$620,000 for last year and \$275,000 for the previous year. The current negotiated contract will run out on June 30, 2018 - leaving little time to sit on the sidelines.

Hardy said they would likely start negotiating on the next contract in about six months.

Part of the reason for the time lapse, Hardy said, was a hiccup in the negotiations, but that was straightened out by diligent work from Mayor Carlo DeMaria and the negotiating team.

"There was a slight hiccup, which was a miscommunication between both sides," he said. "That was a bump in the road, but we were able to work it out and move forward...The City and the negotiating team worked hard on it. The mayor sat in the room with us and it probably wouldn't have gotten done without him there. That was a big factor."

The negotiating team for the Union included Vice President Dana Sears, Secretary/Treasurer Sean Hogan, and Executive Board member Kevin Leary.

Hardy said that team was "instrumental" in getting things worked out smoothly last month.

CORREIA'S THREE RUN BLAST POWERS RHS SOFTBALL TO WALK-OFF VICTORY

Revere High senior captain Victoria Correia blasted a two-strike, two-out, three-run homer in the bottom of the seventh inning to give the Lady Patriots softball team a dramatic, 6-5 victory over previously-undefeated Marblehead last Monday at St. Mary's field.

"The ball left her bat like a rocket and went out of the park on a line," said RHS head coach Joe Ciccarello of Victoria's bash, which literally was the shot heard 'round the world (or at least in the neighborhood) when it ricocheted off the scoreboard and made a loud bang for a dramatic sound-effect.

Up until the fateful bottom of the seventh, the contest appeared firmly in the grasp of the visiting Lady Magicians, who had built a 5-1 lead, and whose pitcher, Charlotte Plakans, had overpowered the Lady Patriots through the first six innings.

Revere's lone run had come via the scratch variety on a base hit by Eve Lescovitz, a sacrifice bunt, and then an RBI base hit by Adriana Fusco.

Fusco, a plucky freshman, had earned the nod from Ciccarello as his starting pitcher with the Lady Pats' regular starter (and clean-up hitter), Olivia McManus, sidelined after being struck in the wrist by a line drive back to the mound in the previous game.

However, Adriana rose to the challenge, keeping the first-place Marbleheaders in check, allowing just four earned runs on three hits in seven innings, and thereby giving her teammates a chance to win.

The decisive bottom of the seventh began inauspiciously, with Jolie Giuliano, Revere's #6 hitter in the order, drawing a base-on-balls.

Adriana Keefe followed with a single and #9 batter Danielle Dion did likewise to load the bases with one out.

Leskovitz, Revere's sophomore shortstop who does it all for the Lady Patriots, then delivered a clutch, two-run single to draw Revere within 5-3 with the tying runs on base. A ground out by Alexis Iacoviello moved both runners into scoring position, but that would prove to be superfluous. Correia came up next --

and the rest was history.

"We've won a lot of big games in the past, but this definitely rates as one of the most exciting," said Ciccarello. "We had not been able to get anything going all game, but we told the girls before they went to bat in the seventh that they could do it if they believed in themselves. We are a young team overall, but this is the sort of game that builds character and grit."

Ciccarello and his crew have a busy week after two rainouts last week. They were set to play at Swampscott this past Monday and will trek to Lynn English today (Wednesday). Lynn Classical comes here tomorrow (Thursday) in a makeup game and Salem visits this coming Monday. The Lady Patriots will make the long ride to Gloucester next Wednesday.

RHS BASEBALL DEFEATS SOMERVILLE, EVERETT

The Revere High baseball team took the measure of Somerville and Everett, a pair of former foes from the Greater Boston League who have joined the Northeastern Conference, in recent contests between the long-time rivals.

In an 11-2 rout of Somerville, RHS starting pitcher Frank Sims earned the victory on the mound, tossing one-hit, no-run ball through the five innings he worked. Lucas Rincon went 2-for-3 with two RBI and teammate E.J. Leone terrorized the Highlanders, going 2-for-2 with two walks and four stolen bases.

Jon Murphy gave Revere a 1-0 in the bottom of the second with a bases-loaded single that scored Matt Cravotta, who had reached on a dropped third strike.

The Patriots then exploded for four runs in the third on RBI base hits by Kasey Cummings (that scored Leone, who had singled and stolen second), James O'Donnell (that scored two runs), and Lucas Rincon.

Murphy brought across his second RBI of the day with a sacrifice fly that scored Alex Baez in the fifth and Revere put the game away with five more runs in the sixth. A Somerville throwing error allowed Leone and Kevin DePaula to score, Rincon singled

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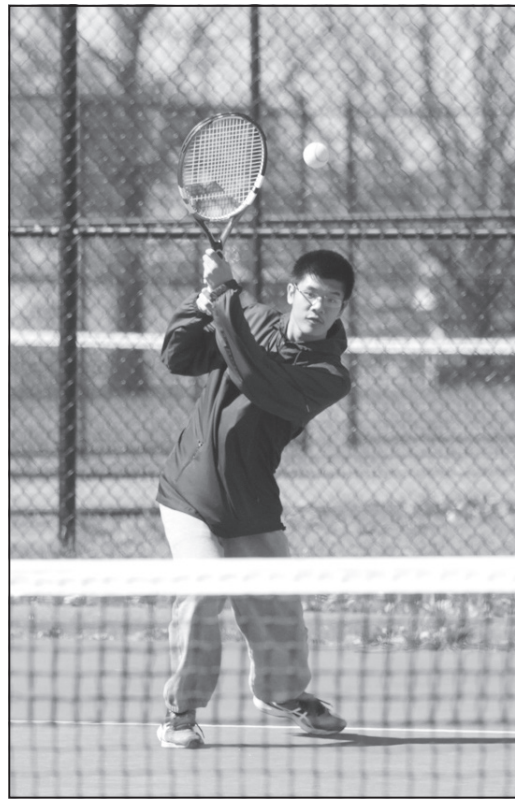

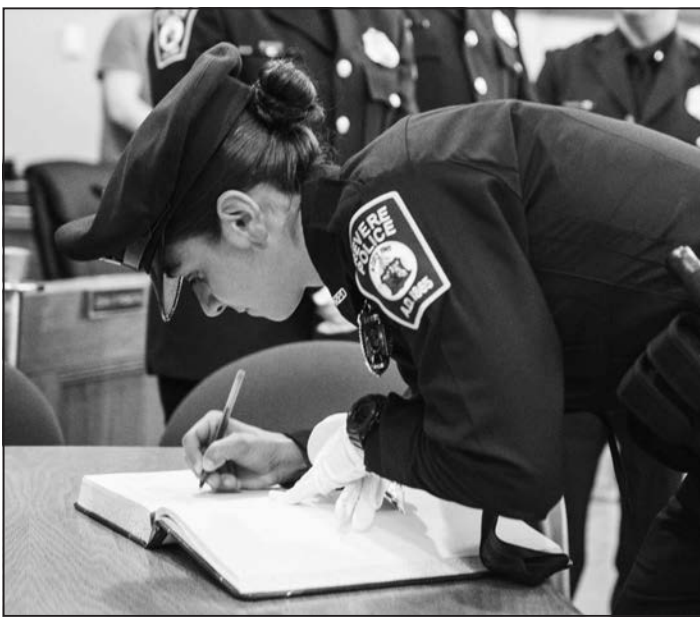

TWO HELD IN REVERE MAN'S MURDER

Two men already facing separate gun charges were arraigned Monday in the January shooting death of Revere's Alexander Mervin, 22.

Jerion Moore, 19, of Stoughton and Nicholas Sicellon, 18, of Dorchester, were each arraigned in Roxbury Municipal Court on a charge of murder in Mervin's shooting death. At the request of Assistant District Attorney David Bradley of Conley's Homicide Unit, Judge Kenneth Fiandaca ordered both men held without bail.

At approximately 1:45 p.m. on Jan. 11, Boston Police

responded to a ShotSpotter activation at a Whittier Street parking lot just a few hundred yards from Boston Police Headquarters. There, they encountered Mervin, who had been shot multiple times as he cleaned out his car in the parking lot. He was rushed to Boston Medical Center, where he died of his injuries.

Ballistic evidence and witness statements indicate that two assailants opened fire on Mervin. Video captured by an MBTA public safety camera captured two men later identified as Moore and Sicellon as they left the scene and entered the Shawmut Avenue home of a relative of Moore. Sicellon then summoned an Uber that took them from the area minutes later.

The two men were identified through records linking Moore to the address the men entered and through the credit card and telephone number on record with Uber, Bradley told the court.

In the weeks following Mervin's homicide, Moore and Sicellon were each arrested separately on unrelated firearm charges. Moore was arrested Jan. 27 in Dorchester after he fled from officers investigating a man who was in Moore's company; Moore was seen pulling a gun from his jacket pocket as he ran, prosecutors said. Sicellon was arrested in Dorchester two days later on Jan. 29 after he fled from a motor vehicle stop on foot. Officers observed him toss one firearm as he ran, and a second firearm was found on his person when he was taken into custody. Both firearms had previously been reported stolen. Sicellon has remained held on \$15,000 bail since his arrest; Moore was released and ordered to wear a GPS monitor after a judge reduced the \$5,000 bail imposed at arraignment to \$2,500 in February. He was taken into custody at his home in Stoughton on Saturday evening.

They return to court June 4.

PEDESTRIAN AND BICYCLE SAFETY GRANT

Mayor Brian Arrigo and Chief of Police James Guido announced that the Revere

Police Department was recently awarded a grant from the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security, Office of Grants and Research - Highway Safety Division (EOPSS/OGR/HSD) to improve traffic safety on local roads for pedestrians and bicyclists.

In total, over \$375,000 was awarded to 84 police departments across the Commonwealth, with funding from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

With nearly 6,000 pedestrians killed in 2016 across the country, pedestrians now account for a larger proportion (16-percent) of traffic fatalities than they have in the past 33 years. In Massachusetts, that rate is even higher, with pedestrians representing more than 20-percent of all traffic fatalities. Bicyclists are dying at higher rates nationally as well—the 840 killed in traffic crashes in 2016 are the most since 1991.

"Bicyclists and pedestrians are at risk to the motoring public because they may not be immediately visible to drivers and unlike those in vehicles, nothing protects them in a crash," said Chief Guido. "We'll use crash data and community input to identify crosswalks, intersections, and roadways where our enforcement efforts can yield the largest impact on pedestrian and bicyclist safety."

Under the grant, departments will pay for overtime enforcement to increase compliance with traffic laws by all road users. Departments are also eligible to purchase equipment to enhance the visibility of crosswalks and to buy bicycle helmets.

anticipated project completion date in 2021.

"We appreciate the Department of Veterans Affairs' approval to replace the existing long-term care facility at the Chelsea Soldiers' Home Campus," said Secretary of Veterans' Services Francisco A. This financing will allow the Soldiers' Home to further improve and enhance the vital care that they provide our veterans."

Gov. Baker was joined at his 2018 State of the Commonwealth Address by U.S. Navy Veteran Tom Miller, who lives at the Chelsea Soldiers' Home, Director of Nursing Debbie Antonelli and Superintendent Cheryl Poppe to celebrate the administration's commitment to this necessary funding.

"This funding will allow us to provide our veterans with a long-awaited updated home that will enhance their quality of life with increased privacy and greater access to services," said Chelsea Soldiers' Home Superintendent Cheryl Lussier Poppe. "Our veterans deserve the very best, and this home will complement the quality care our veterans receive here at the Soldiers' Home. We are grateful for the support of the Baker-Polito administration for this opportunity."

The Soldiers' Home in Chelsea first opened its doors to Massachusetts veterans in 1882. The first residents were Civil War veterans who were wounded or unable to care for themselves, many of whom had previously resided in the Commonwealth's "alms houses." Today, Chelsea carries on Massachusetts' proud tradition of helping all veterans in need of both long-term care and domiciliary / supportive services. 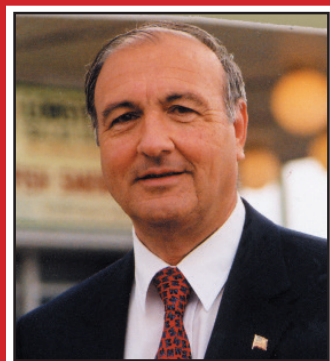

million 'medical village.'

At last week's City Council hearing the Council voted in favor of changing zoning to establish a Medical Village Overlay District on all of the land lying between and bounded by Lynnfield St., Dartmouth Street, Anchor Road and Woodland North. The vote would pave the way for NSMC to close the 20-acre Union Hospital campus and replace it with a five to six-acre medical village. NSMC needed a zoning change because the neighborhood is currently zoned to allow only residential, single-families and a 'Hospital'. The zoning change to allow for a hospital was done back in the 1950s through a special permit so Union Hospital could be constructed. Because the medical village is not technically a hospital, special zoning was again needed.

At Tuesday's meeting, NSMC's Senior Vice President Mary Jo Gagnon testified that the new facility would house urgent care, lab services, outpatient services, radiology services, as well as primary and specialty care physicians. To quell the fears of some residents that the loss of Union Hospital would be detrimental to the health and well-being of patients here, Gagnon pointed out that most people currently visiting Union Hospital will have the same level of services.

"When people think of a hospital, they think emergency rooms and inpatient services," said Gagnon. "However, a majority of the visits are outpatient services and primary care visits and most emergency care can be done in an urgent care facility."

Gagnon said some may point out that if they have a heart attack, they won't have a hospital in the city to go to in order to receive care. However, Gagnon said currently heart attack patients and some others are already being sent to NSMC's Salem campus because that facility is better equipped to deal with those types of emergencies. Gagnon insisted for the average Union Hospital patient not much will change by changing the facility from a traditional hospital into a medical village.

Ward One City Councilor Wayne Lozzi said he was in favor of the zoning change as the only alternative to the closing of Union Hospital.

"My preference would like to see the hospital stay, but it's not happening," said Lozzi. "They are proposing to build a facility that will provide needed and modern medical services and state-of-the-art med-

ical services. I hope that we will move forward on this."

City Council President Darren Cyr also said that he doesn't want to see the hospital go, but the reality is Union Hospital is going to close.

"We are trying to work something out that is in the best interest of City of Lynn and the residents that live up there," he said.

RECREATIONAL MARIJUANA COULD BE HEADED TO EASTIE

EAST BOSTON – The medicinal marijuana shop slated to open on McClellan Highway at the former Enterprise Rental Car facility may become a recreational marijuana shop.

According to a source working with Newton-based Happy Valley Ventures LLC, the company will most likely apply to the state for a recreational dispensary license.

Happy Valley gained unanimous Boston Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) approval last year to open a medicinal-marijuana dispensary at 220 McClellan Highway.

The ZBA approval last year was one of the last hurdles Happy Valley Ventures had to clear before the state's Department of Public Health opening up its marijuana shop here. Recently the company gained state Chapter 91 approval for the proposed marijuana dispensary. The company had to go through the Chapter 91 license because the McClellan Highway location abuts the Chelsea Creek.

Under the recreational marijuana laws the state has invited companies that already went through the exhaustive process of gaining a medicinal marijuana dispensary license to be some of the first to apply for a recreational-marijuana dispensary license.

Recreational pot shops are set to open in the state on July 1. Happy Valley Ventures has experience with medical marijuana facilities in other states and said the plan is to create a state of the art, high tech 7,500 sq. ft. marijuana facility. Last year the Ludlow Board of Selectmen signed off on Happy Valley's plan to begin cultivating medical marijuana for its proposed dispensaries in Eastie, as well as in Amherst and Gloucester.

Despite a 29-15 vote against the dispensary by the Orient Heights Neighborhood

Council (OHNC), the dispensary received widespread support in the neighborhood outside of Orient Heights and from former City Councilor Sal LaMattina.

The neighborhood overwhelmingly supported both the medical marijuana and recreational marijuana ballot questions during two previous state elections. Patients both here in Eastie and in neighboring communities testified at OHNC meetings and the ZBA hearing that too many patients do not have easy access to medical marijuana due to the slow process of dispensaries opening statewide. With 35,000 medicinal marijuana patients in the Commonwealth and only a handful of dispensaries patients here said opening the 220 McClellan Highway facility would begin improving access to this medicinal therapy.

Others have said the proposed facility is an ideal location because it is separated from the neighborhood by the four-lane McClellan Highway and will be arguably the most secure building in the neighborhood.

According to the source Happy Valley Ventures will begin a widespread community process as the propose the change from a medical to recreational facility in the coming weeks. The group will most likely not limit its meeting solely to the OHNC because the company feels the dispensary is a widespread community issue not limited to one section of Eastie.

Happy Valley could not be reached for official comment on the plans.

LIANA LAMATTINA LEAVING MADARO'S STAFF

EAST BOSTON – After three years serving as State Rep. Adrian Madaro's Legislative Aide and running his successful campaign for state rep in 2015 Liana LaMattina announced she will be leaving Madaro's office at the end of week to focus on her last year of law school.

LaMattina and Madaro have been close friends since childhood and both attended Boston Latin School together.

In 2015 former Rep. Carlo Basile announced he was leaving office to work in Gov. Charlie Baker's administration and a special election was scheduled for March of that year.

Only 23 years old at the time, LaMattina was tapped by Madaro to run his campaign for the state rep seat. Just one year removed from her graduation from Boston University where she received a degree in Business Management with a concentration in Organizational Behavior, LaMattina became an organizational dynamo for the campaign.

"Both Adrian and I went all in," she told the East Boston Times in 2015 after Madaro's win. "And especially with Adrian being a close, personal friend of mine, I really wanted to give it my all."

LaMattina assumed command of many responsibilities including organizing Madaro's daily schedule and volunteers, and coordinating efforts with Sage Systems on such important aspects as the graphics for campaign signs, newspaper advertisement, campaign literature, political canvassing, and events.

"My role was more of the analytical and strategical background and making sure that everything that needed to be done was done," said LaMattina in 2015. Though this was her first foray into the management of campaigns, she was no stranger to Election night successes. Her father, Sal LaMattina, was a popular Boston City Councilor who had represented East Boston from 2006 to 2017.

"This was the biggest decision I can make in my professional career – who was going to be my campaign manager – and I didn't have Plan B after Liana," said Madaro of

their success in 2015. "If that doesn't speak volumes about how I feel about her – that I entrusted her with my future like that – and she did not disappoint."

Madaro would later call LaMattina the best campaign manager anyone could ask for.

After securing the Democratic nomination and winning the general election, Madaro brought LaMattina on as his legislative aide at the State House. During her tenure, LaMattina has served East Boston with tireless dedication by handling constituent issues, community concerns, and legislation for Madaro's office.

"Adrian and I have known each other for over 20 years, making our work together on behalf of East Boston even more meaningful," said LaMattina. "I have learned a lot over the past few years, both as campaign manager and legislative aide, and I will take this experience with me as I embark on my legal career."

After concluding her position with Madaro, LaMattina will be interning for the Suffolk County District Attorney's Office as a student prosecutor and focusing on her final year at Suffolk University Law School. In addition, she will serve as Chair of the Committee to Elect Adrian Madaro.

"I want to thank Liana for her years of service as my aide, and for helping me achieve this position as my campaign manager," said Madaro. "We have a great friendship and have made a strong team professionally. I wish Liana the best as she finishes law school and establishes her legal career."

Madaro said Steve Gingras will replace LaMattina as his legislative aid and will begin duties on April 30.

Gingras will be responsible for handling the day to day functions of the office, including constituent services, policy initiatives, and legislative budget priorities.

A lifelong Eastie resident, Gingras is a graduate of Boston Latin School and Boston College. Prior to receiving this position, he interned for Madaro for over a year and frequently attended meetings in the community on behalf of the office. Gingras also interned on Capitol Hill for the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs on a Clough Civic Internship Grant from Boston College, where he focused on researching and drafting policy to combat the nationwide opioid epidemic. Gingras was also selected for the Ward Fellowship at Boston Latin School, the same public service program Madaro participated when he attended Latin School.

"It is a great honor to be offered this amazing opportunity to serve my home community of East Boston," said Gingras. "Public service has long been the motivation which has formed my academic and professional experience, and I can think of no greater way to begin my career than by giving back to the neighborhood in which I've grown up and

lived all my life".

Madaro said he was excited to have Gingras join his office.

"He brings with him valuable experience, knowledge, and, most importantly, passion for both public service and East Boston," said Madaro. "I am confident that Steven will be an excellent aide and advocate for our community."

PLANS UNDERWAY FOR FARMER'S MARKET

WINTHROP – Plans are underway to launch the 2018 Winthrop Farmer's Market. While no dates have been set, there are 17 approved vendors so far. Under the direction of Donna Sears, the market will have a couple of changes this year.

First, the location of the market will be on the Walden Street basketball courts. So far, it is unknown if power will be available to vendors there. Food vendors will need to bring their own power supply.

The Winthrop Farmers Market has also applied to be a SNAP authorized retailer and times to take part in this benefit will be announced at each market. "This will be clearly advertised," said Sears.

There are 17 approved vendors at this point – six of those will need to submit information to the Board of Health. There is always room for more volunteers if anyone is interested.

He earned two masters degrees at Boston College and Simmons College. He was awarded his PhD from the University of Pittsburgh.

On Sept. 3, 1966, he married Alice Marie Keohane. A prominent academic with a global reputation, he initially worked at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (1965-1969). He then taught at the School of Library and Information Science, Simmons College, Boston, for 49 years, where he was a professor and later dean (1994-2002). Upon retirement as Dean, he was awarded the status of dean and professor emeritus and continued to teach and publish until just before he died. He published twelve books and numerous articles. He was also vice-president and board secretary of the H.W. Wilson Foundation in New York. He was a visiting professor at Wayne State University, the University of Washington, the University of Arizona, and Texas Women's University. He received many professional awards and fellowships in his long academic career and delivered presentations and lectures worldwide. He was a loving and dedicated husband and father, dedicated to his family and his community, and loved by his many friends, students, and colleagues across the world.

He is survived by his wife Alice of 51 years; his son the Rev. Dr. James M Matarazzo, Jr., of Oxford, England; his daughter Mrs. Susan Eileen Abrego and his son-in-law Dr. José Antonio Abrego, of Lynnfield; his granddaughter Katherine Sophia Abrego; his brother Ronald Matarazzo, of Winthrop; his sister Marie Matarazzo, of Winthrop; as well as many nieces, nephews, cousins, and other relatives and friends. He was preceded in death by his beloved brother Michael Kenneth Matarazzo (1943-2010).

Services were held April 21.
