Zoning Board approves variances

The Revere Zoning Board approved several variances for Gate Residential Properties LLC for housing construction at 21 Revere Beach Blvd. and 20-50 Ocean Ave.

Damion Zarri, with Gate Residential explained that the two separate projects would create a 200-unit project. He said plans call for a 127-unit mixed-use development at 21 Revere Beach Blvd., and 73 units in the rear building at 20-50 Ocean Ave.

Gate Residential is requesting the minimum for parking requirements for apartments, retail use and restaurant use. In addition it seeks a minimum loading space requirement for restaurant use and

Just another hidden consequence to the popularity of the Revere Public Schools and its growing enrollment is getting all of the students and families into and out of Harry Della Russo Stadium for graduation exercises.

Supt. Dianne Kelly announced that graduation will take place at the Stadium on Thursday, June 7, and there will be more than 500 students graduating this year - another blockbuster class.

Five weeks away from the big day, Kelly said they are meeting with Fire Chief Chris Bright and police officials to try to iron out some details when it comes to moving so many people all at once.


"There are concerns from last year about the Stadium being overcrowded and the egresses when people were leaving," she said. "We're going to meet with the Police

Mike McGee were unsuccessful.

The building was purchased by Atlantic Management and VMD Companies who teamed up to buy the 50-acre site for \$54.6 million last year. The lease for the 830,000-squarefoot building expires in August.

"Hostess went through this and came out on top," said former NECCO employee Alisa Hills. "We would hate for NECCO to go away."

Former CEO Ed Gulachenski (2011-2015) launched a Go Fund me page to save NEC-CO a couple of weeks ago.

Since then he's raised over \$4,320 for 101 different people. Donations range from \$5 to \$500.

Hills said when Gulachenski announced the crowdfunding idea his phone rang more than expected.

Gulchenski has said he needs \$30 million to buy the company. He plans to put in \$5-\$10 million of his own fund and raise the additional money through crowd-sourcing

NECCO's CEO Mark Mc-Gee notified Revere Mayor Brian Arrigo that without a buyer by May 6, the 171-year

old confectionary company would have to layoff employees. NECCO, the New England Confectionary Co., moved into a building at 135 American Legion Highway back in 2003 after being in Cambridge for years.

The makers of NECCO wafers, candy conversation hearts, Clark Bars, and a dozen other candy products, reported steady revenues in 2005 of \$100 million. In 2010 NECCO was listed for sale with a New York broker, but then the listing was pulled in 2011.

of 80 degree weather later this week, the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) is reminding the public of the dangers associated with swimming in water bodies this time of year. Currently, water temperatures in Massachusetts lakes and ponds are in the 40's and 50's, while ocean temperatures remain in the 40's. Swimming in such cold water, even in short periods of time, can quickly cause hypothermia in the human body.

"After such a long winter season, the Department of Conservation and Recreation is ecstatic to have people from all over the Commonwealth having the opportunity to get outside and enjoy our state parks and other natural resources," said DCR Commissioner Leo Roy. "With the start of warmer air temperatures, it is important that we all use caution near water bodies, particularly this time of year, when cold water temperatures can be detrimental to one's safety.'

Hypothermia can set in at approximately 15-30 minutes in 32.5-40 degree water temperatures, and 30-60 minutes in 40-50 degree water temperatures. Additionally, cold water robs the body of heat 32 times faster than cold air, can cause the body to experience muscle spasms and cramps, and can cause the body to go into shock and begin hyperventilating. If you or someone you are with were to fall into a water body, it is extremely important to not panic, and to conserve energy to avoid exhaustion and unconsciousness.

difficulty in speaking; confusion; diminished coordination; fatigue; and an increase in heart rate. Furthermore, it is important to note that the DCR starts guarding major coastal and inland beaches weekends only on Memorial Day Weekend. Beaches will not be guarded seven days a week until June 16. Those who choose to swim at a location where a lifeguard is not on duty, do so at their own risk.

Chelsea Soldiers' Home secures federal funding for Center

Gov. Charlie Baker announced last Friday that the state has secured approximately \$70 million in federal funding for the new 154-bed Community Living Center at the Chelsea Soldiers' Home - federal funding that pretty much gives the green light to proceed on the project.

State leaders have made a priority of designing and funding the \$199 million project, but getting the federal funding was always a crucial piece of the puzzle that had to come through.

Administration State Home Construction Grant Program announced it would provide a 65 percent reimbursement of approved construction projects, including the Soldiers' Home.

"Our veterans have sacrificed greatly to protect our freedoms and we are proud to see this project move forward as we continue to provide them with great care and dignity," said Baker. "We are grateful to the VA for their support of Massachusetts' veterans and this funding allows us to construct a state-of-the-

a minimum screening for an Surfside Lofts. off-street parking area.

He said initial plans call for a 1.21 parking ratio, which is 142 spaces. He noted they are also building 38 spaces on Ocean Avenue parcel and this will make the parking ratio 1.4 parking spaces

"It's all being designed consistent with the RC2 zoning district and we're also designing for the "creative arts" district not yet on zoning maps for the city," Zarri said. The creative arts district runs from the Gate Residential Property all the way to Shirley Avenue to encourage retail, restaurant, art galleries, and seasonal open space.

"Our development includes a 4,000 square-foot restaurant, a series of arcade/retail spaces covering 1,600 square feet," Zarri said, calling the area a highly underutilized one and an area that will have upgraded sidewalks and a rebuilt boardwalk.

Ward 1 Councillor Joanne McKenna said she was pleased with the recent deed restriction that states the two buildings can only be sold together. She also noted that the front building would block the view of the people who live at

"I don't know how we can

help them with their concerns because they bought there because of the views of the beach," McKenna said, adding she feels strongly about developing Revere Beach." It's long overdue. We have parcels that haven't been built on, buildings falling down. Anything that brings revenue to the city and brings people to Revere Beach,

I'm in favor of." Bob O'Brien, director of development for Revere, is also a resident of Surfside Lofts at 10 Ocean Ave. He made it clear to the Zoning Board he was there for the city. He called that the two parcels under discussion are some of the most attractive waterfront parcels in the northeast.

"It's very timely they're

•House Budget Encouraging

The House Budget passed last week by the state House of Representatives has some encouraging news regarding school financing - and word from Beacon Hill is that the funding changes will outlast any vetoes from Gov. Charlie Baker.

The House put in a \$12.5 million "Pothole Account" to help districts hurt by the change in 'Economically Disadvantaged' definitions a few years ago. Last year, there was no such funding, but this year it looks like that money will make it through.

"With the pothole fund, we'll be okay; without it, we'll have a challenging year," she said.

The money would be allocated to the state Department of Elementary and Secondary

Education (DESE), and they would be charged with disbursing it to the affected district.

Kelly said she has heard from Speaker Bob DeLeo's office that Revere will be okay.

"The Speaker's office has been very proactive in communicating with us and letting us know Revere schools will have what they need next year," she said.

•MCAS Week is a Quiet Week

Many might have wondered why the Revere Public Schools are unusually quiet this week. Well, a lot of it has to do with MCAS testing, which has been going on all week.

Each grade level across the district tests on the same day, and the schools try to avoid testing on Mondays or Fridays. A special breakfast is served to students taking the test as well.

President Trump plans to make drugs affordable again

for seniors.

During his State of the Union address, President Trump pledged to drive down drug prices.

That's a worthy goal. Fortunately, the Trump administration is already pursuing it in ways that protect patients and encourage research and development. Many strategies that candidate Trump proposed on the campaign trail would have done more harm than good.

Candidate Trump wanted to repeal Medicare Part D's "non-interference clause," which prevents the federal government from negotiating drug prices with manufacturers. Private insurers currently handle negotiations for Part D, a prescription drug program that benefits about 42 million Americans. Such interference wouldn't result in lower prices. Private insurers already extract discounts from drug companies. Giving federal bureaucrats the power to negotiate prices "would have a negligible effect on Medicare drug spending," according to the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office.

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs uses such a formulary. As a result, veterans don't have access to nearly 20 percent of the most com-

monly prescribed drugs under Medicare Part D. Candidate Trump also advocated for drug price controls.

Imposing such caps would hinder efforts to develop breakthrough medications, as pharmaceutical companies would struggle to justify research expenditures. Nations that rely on price controls to artificially keep prices low are free riding on U.S. patients, who fund the bulk of medical research and development.

Another promising step is a proposed rule from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). The rule would curb price gouging by pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs). These middlemen negotiate with drug manufacturers to obtain discounts for insurance companies.

PBMs use their buying power to extract rebates from drug makers. From 2010 to 2015, the value of those rebates increased by more than 20 percent annually. But patients picking up their prescriptions often don't benefit from these rebates.

This speeds up the R&D process and results in savings for drug companies, more drug applications for the FDA, and more options for patients. On the campaign trail, candidate Trump promised he would deliver lower drug prices. One year into his presidency, he's on his way to achieving that goal -- thanks to his abandonment of statist price controls and embrace of free-market reforms.

Not only do storms cause problems, but yard waste dumped in the ditch upstream, discarded furniture, tree branches and general trash add to the problem.

"Let's identify steps that need to be taken," Rizzo said. Last week the city council sent a motion presented by Rizzo, Ward 6 Councillor Charles Patch, and Council President Jessica Giannino to the mayor to request a meeting with the state delegation, representatives from the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT), DPW Superintendent Donald Goodwin, Water/Sewer Foreman Joe Maglione, and Rocco Falzone of 55 Tuscano Ave. to discuss a long-term plan to address flooding issues affecting dozens of homes in the Asti and Tuscano avenue area.

"He's been fighting the fight for a long time," Patch said. "The city has been doing their job down there, but the state has no system in place. "That whole culvert system goes through several cities and needs a complete workover. The DPW is concerned

about Mr. Falzone due to his age. The city has done work there the last few years and there has been no flooding. I don't think the state comes down to the Revere part of it."

"Twenty-eight years of this, and it's finally falling on someone's ears, and I really appreciate that," Falzone said, adding he's been in touch with the Army Corp of Engineers, the DEP and the EPA. "Malden Street to the trash grates hasn't been touched in 50 years. This is not a one-shot deal this has to be maintained consistently forever."

Falzone noted that after a walk-through with State Rep. RoseLee Vincent, the DOT showed up to clean. Just last week inmates on a work program were picking up trash for a short amount of time, he said.

Josephine and Lisa Hedrington of 102 Asti Ave. said it's been an ongoing issue, and they have lost possessions in their basement due to flooding. Lisa Hedrington said it's not just water, it's also human waste. She disagreed with Patch about the situation getting better. They have added additional drainage to their property.

"These homes are contaminated," Lisa Hedrington said. "And this has happened repeatedly."


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JROTC STUDENTS RECEIVE RECOGNITION FOR SNOW ANGEL PROGRAM

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


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REVERE YOUTH BASEBALL/SOFTBALL OPENS 2018 SEASON



COUNCIL APPROVES TRANSFER TO STABILIZATION FUND

CHELSEA - The Chelsea City Council approved a request from City Manager Tom Ambrosino to clean up and make a big-time deposit into the City's savings accounts.

The Council approved a \$15 million transfer into the Stabilization Fund on Monday night, and also approved a \$5 million transfer into a new School Stabilization Fund. At the same time, three old savings accounts were closed out with about \$300,000 going into the Stabilization Fund.

The requests came at the behest of Councillor Bob Bishop, who made the requests last month and presided over a committee meeting two weeks ago discussing the matters.

Bishop had indicated that he would like the money in the Stabilization Fund because he believes the City needs to save more money in case of a downturn in the economy. On background, having the money in the Stabilization Fund gives the Council more control over any spending due to the fact that it requires a twothirds vote of the Council.

Ambrosino said he supported both transfers and believed that the School Fund was a wise idea given that there are several projects coming up on the City's schools.

All of them, he said, are in the Capital Improvement Plan.

In the same financial vein, the Council approved the final \$3 million payment on the Clark Avenue Middle School project. The City has been paying cash wherever it can on the project – which is still under construction until this summer - to save money on interest payments accrued from having to borrow.

Part of the project is also funded by state reimbursements.

MYSTIC/TOBIN **BRIDGE REPAIRS** START MAY 7

CHELSEA – The state Deof Transportation artment (MassDOT) announced several changes to the Mystic/ Tobin Bridge repair project, including the one-month closure of the Everett Avenue onramp May 7. MassDOT announced that since several projects in the area are coming underway including the Alford Street Bridge, the North Washington Street Bridge, and Commonwealth Avenue Bridge in Boston – they have adjusted the Tobin work to not close a lane permanently on the lower deck northbound.

permanent lane closure on the lower deck (Route 1 northbound) from April 22 through November of this year, but will instead be adjusting the width of the travel lanes in this area and utilizing offpeak lane closures. Three full lanes of travel will be in place on the bridge this year during peak commute hours.

The full list of impacts this construction season is now as follows:

•Temporary off-peak lane closures on the lower deck (Route 1 northbound) from now through November 2018.

•Temporary off-peak lane closures on the upper deck (Route 1 southbound) from now through November 2018. •Everett Avenue on-ramp

closed at all times for onemonth period beginning on May 7.

•Beacon Street off-ramp closed at all times for a twomonth period beginning in summer 2018.

•Fourth Street off-ramp closed for a one-month period in 2019.

No more than one ramp will be closed at any given time throughout the duration of the project.

'We are investing historic levels of funding into our highway transportation system, and we are seeking to do so in ways that minimize impacts on the travel public and our local communities," said Highway Administrator Jonathan Gulliver. "Our construction teams have worked hard to optimize the schedule of operations to better accommodate travel throughout this area. We continue to encourage members of the public to learn about upcoming traffic impacts and use the appropriate tools to make the best decisions on traveling in order to reach their destinations in an efficient manner."

This \$41.6 million maintenance project involves repairing a section of the deck of the Tobin Bridge, which carries traffic between the Charlestown neighborhood of Boston and Chelsea. Work is scheduled to be completed at the end of 2020 with lane closures and traffic impacts occurring during each of the 2018, 2019, and 2020 construction seasons.

CHELSEA - The City and the Firefighters' Union Local 143 have come to terms on a new contract that goes back two years to Fiscal Year 2016. "It's finally concluded," said President Craig Hardy. "Both sides agree it's a fair deal. We all agree it's good that it's finally over...The membership ratified it overwhelmingly. It was a solid ratification with very little opposition. Part of the reason for the time lapse, Hardy said, was a hiccup in the negotiations, but that was straightened out by diligent work from Mayor Carlo DeMaria and the negotiating team.

"There was a slight hiccup, which was a miscommunication between both sides," he said. "That was a bump in the road, but we were able to work it out and move forward...The City and the negotiating team worked hard on it. The mayor sat in the room with us and it probably wouldn't have gotten done without him there. That was a big factor."

The negotiating team for the Union included Vice President Dana Sears, Secretary/ Treasurer Sean Hogan, and Executive Board member Kevin Leary.

Hardy said that team was "instrumental" in getting things worked out smoothly last month.



With nearly 6,000 pedestrians killed in 2016 across the country, pedestrians now account for a larger proportion (16-percent) of traffic fatalities than they have in the past 33 years. In Massachusetts, that rate is even higher, with pedestrians representing more than 20-percent of all traffic fatalities. Bicyclists are dying at higher rates nationally as well-the 840 killed in traffic crashes in 2016 are the most since 1991.

"Bicyclists and pedestrians are at risk to the motoring public because they may not be immediately visible to drivers and unlike those in vehicles, nothing protects them in a crash," said Chief Guido. "We'll use crash data and community input to identify crosswalks, intersections, and roadways where our enforcement efforts can yield the largest impact on pedestrian and bicyclist safety.

Under the grant, departments will pay for overtime enforcement to increase compliance with traffic laws by all road users. Departments are also eligible to purchase equipment to enhance the visibility of crosswalks and to buy bicycle helmets.

Chelsea has a board of trustees appointed by the Secretary of Health and Human Services. The trustees and DVS share responsibility for the management of the home.

million 'medical village.' At last week's City Council hearing the Council voted in favor of changing zoning to establish a Medical Village Overlay District on all of the land lying between and bounded by Lynnfield St., Dartmouth Street, Anchor Road and Woodland North. The vote would pave the for NSMC to close the 20-acre Union Hospital campus and replace it a five to six-acre medical village. NSMC needed a zoning change because the neighborhood is currently zoned to allow only residential, single-families and a 'Hospital". The zoning change to allow for a hospital was done back in the 1950s through a special permit so Union Hospital could be constructed. Because the medical village is not technically a hospital, special zoning was again needed.

At Tuesday's meeting, NS-MC's Senior Vice President Mary Jo Gagnon testified that the new facility would house urgent care, lab services, outpatient services, radiology services, as well as primary and specialty care physicians. To quell the fears of some residents that the loss of Union Hospital would be detrimental to the health and well-being of patients here, Gagnon pointed out that most people currently visiting Union Hospital will have the same level of ser-

"When people think of a hospital, they think emergency rooms and inpatient services," said Gagnon. "However, a majority of the visits are outpatient services and primary care visits and most emergency care can be done in an urgent care facility.

Gagnon said some may point out that if they have a heart attack, they won't have a hospital in the city to go to in order to receive care. However, Gagnon said currently heart attack patents and some others are already being sent to NSMC's Salem campus because that facility is better equipped to deal with those types of emergencies. Gagnon insisted for the average Union Hospital patient not much will change by changing the facility from a traditional hospital into a medical village.

Ward One City Councilor Wayne Lozzi said he was in

City Council President Darren Cyr also said that he doesn't want to see the hospital go, but the reality is Union Hospital is going to close.

RECREATIONAL MARIJUANA COULD **BE HEADED TO** EASTIE

EAST BOSTON - The medicinal marijuana shop slated to open on McClellan Highway at the former Enterprise Rental Car facility may become a recreational marijuana shop

According to a source working with Newton-based Happy Valley Ventures LLC, the company will most likely apply to the state for a recreational dispensary license.

Happy Valley gained unanimous Boston Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) approval last year to open a medicinal-marijuana dispensary at 220 McClellan Highway.

The ZBA approval last year was one of the last hurdles Happy Valley Ventures had to clear before the state's Department of Public Health opening up its marijuana shop here. Recently the company gained state Chapter 91 approval for the proposed marijuana dispensary. The company had to go through the Chapter 91 license because the McClellan Highway location abuts the Chelsea Creek.

Under the recreational marijuana laws the state has invited companies that already went through the exhaustive process of gaining a medicinal marijuana dispensary license to be some of the first to apply for a recreational-marijuana dispensary license.

Recreational pot shops are set to open in the state on July 1. Happy Valley Ventures has experience with medical marijuana facilities in other state and said the plan is to create a state of the art, high tech 7,500 sq. ft. marijuana facility. Last Council (OHNC), the dispensary received widespread support in the neighborhood outside of Orient Heights and from former City Councilor Sal LaMattina.

The neighborhood overwhelmingly supported both the medical marijuana and recreational marijuana ballot questions during two previous state elections. Patients both here in Eastie and in neighboring communities testified at OHNC meetings and the ZBA hearing that too many patients do not have easy access to medical marijuana due to the slow process of dispensaries opening statewide. With 35,000 medicinal marijuana patients in the Commonwealth and only a handful of dispensaries patients here said opening the 220 McClellan Highway facility would begin improving access to this medicinal therapy.

Others have said the proposed facility is an ideal location because it is separated from the neighborhood by the four-lane McClellan Highway and will be arguably the most secure building in the neighborhood.

According to the source Happy Valley Ventures will begin a widespread community process as the propose the change from a medical to recreational facility in the coming weeks. The group will most likely not limit its meeting solely to the OHNC because the company feels the dispensary is a widespread community issue not limited to one section of Eastie.

Happy Valley could not be reached for official comment on the plans.

LIANA LAMATTINA LEAVING MADARO'S **STAFF**

EAST BOSTON -After three years serving as State Rep. Adrian Madaro's Legislative Aide and running his successful campaign for state rep in 2015 Liana LaMattina announced she will be leaving Madaro's office at the end of week to focus on her last year of law school.

LaMattina and Madaro have been close friends since childhood and both attended

LIBRARY TRUSTEE JAMES MATARAZZO DEAD AT 77

WINTHROP - Longtime library supporter and trustee of the Winthrop Public Library James Matarazzo passed away April 17 surrounded by his family at the age of 77.

For over 50 years he worked at Simmons College in the School of Library and Information Science.

He was born on Jan. 4, 1941, in Stoneham to the late Angelo Michael and Anna (Finamore) Matarazzo. He lived in East Boston until the age of 5 when his family moved to Winthrop into a house that his father built. He attended Winthrop High School, Class of 1959, and then attended Boston College. He earned two masters degrees at Boston College and Simmons College. He was awarded his PhD from the University of Pittsburgh.

On Sept. 3, 1966, he married Alice Marie Keohane. A prominent academic with a global reputation, he initially worked at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (1965-1969). He then taught at the School of Library and Information Science, Simmons College, Boston, for 49 years, where he was a professor and later dean (1994-2002). Upon retirement as Dean, he was awarded the status of dean and professor emeritus and continued to teach and publish until just before he died. He published twelve books and numerous articles. He was also vice-president and board secretary of the H.W. Wilson Foundation in New York. He was a visiting professor at Wayne State University, the University of Washington, the University of Arizona, and Texas Women's' University. He received many professional awards and fellowships in his long academic career and delivered presentations and lectures worldwide. He was a loving and dedicated husband and father, dedicated to his family and his community, and loved by his many friends, students, and colleagues across the world.

He is survived by his wife Alice of 51 years; his son the Rev. Dr. James M Matarazzo, librarians both in our state, Jr., of Oxford, England; his daughter Mrs. Susan Eileen Abrego and his son-in-law Dr. José Antonio Abrego, of Lynnfield; his granddaughter Katherine Sophia Abrego; his brother Ronald Matarazzo, of Winthrop; his sister Marie Matarazzo, of Winthrop; as well as many nieces, nephews, cousins, and other relatives and friends. 
